Description: Rhododendron is a large perennial evergreen, acid loving shrub which is native to the Iberian Peninsula and Asia. A dense, suckering shrub or small tree growing to 5 m tall, rarely 8 m.

It was introduced to Ireland during the 18th Century as an ornamental garden plant because of its attractive flowers.

There are over 900 species, but only Rhododendron ponticum is invasive in Ireland. Since its introduction, it has escaped into the wild and is particularly invasive in the west, north-west and south-west of the country.

Rhododendron easily naturalises and becomes a pest in some situations, often covering whole hillsides.



The flowers are 3.5 to 5 cm in diameter, violetpurple, often with small greenish-yellow spots or streaks.

It can colonise a range of habitats including agricultural land,

grasslands, woodland, urban areas, roadsides and wastelands and thrives on acidic soil in areas with mild, moist climatic conditions often in shaded areas.

The leaves are evergreen, 6-18 cm long and 2 to 5 cm wide.



Once established, it forms dense, long-lived thickets which smother the ground flora and suppress the regeneration of native trees and shrubs

It can reproduce by both sexual and asexual means. reproducing by vegetative means,

In Ireland, colonisation takes place mainly through seed dispersal. The fruit is a dry capsule 1.5 to 2.5 cm long, containing numerous small seeds.

Each flower head can produce between 3,000 and 7,000 seeds.

A single Rhododendron bush can produce over 1 million seeds per annum. Seeds are

amongst the smallest and lightest of any plant species and are designed primarily for dispersal by wind.

Seeds can be dispersed up to 100 metres by wind.
